We'll need a final car count with names and vehicles for the parade order number by November 1st.



Cruising And Playing The Radio

Maybe it was Chuck Berry who best described the joy of driving an automobile when he sang, "Cruising and playing the radio. With no particular place to go." At least since WWII, the radio has been an integral part of the freedom offered to us by the automobile. In the early 1990s I tried to describe "cruising and playing the radio" to a visiting English friend, but he couldn't comprehend it. It was Friday night. So, we walked the few blocks from my house to downtown Lincolnton, N.C. where there were hundreds of teenagers cruising in their cars. This prompted two questions from the Englishman: "What is the purpose of all this?" and "Why do they play their radios so loud?" When I tried to explain that it was a unique part of American culture thanks to "freedom of the road", he smiled and said, "Well, all these young people sure seem to be enjoying themselves!"

I grew up "cruising and playing the radio". The year I was born was when the 45 rpm record was introduced by RCA Victor. The year I learned to drive the 8-track player was becoming the big thing. I still have a box of 8-track tapes in the garage, but the player hanging under the dash is long gone.

Let's share some important events in our history of cruising and playing the radio: In the 1920s and 1930s in-car radios were being introduced. They were expensive, adding about 25% to the price of a Model A. The top song of 1930 was "Happy Days Are Here Again".

In 1952, even though practically all stations were broadcasting in AM, the first in-car FM radio became available thanks to Blaupunkt. The top song was "Blue Tango". In 1963 vacuum tubes were replaced with transistors and car radios became "solid state". The top song was "Surfin' USA".

In 1965 8-track players became available. Over the next several years 8-track players were added to many cars. The top song was "Wooly Bully".

By 1969 cars added stereo to their sound system, where the tuner amplified two channels, not just one. The top song was "Sugar, Sugar".

In 1970 companies like Alpine and Pioneer sought to solve our problem of the 8-track player eating up the tape with cassette tapes. With the advent of cassette tapes, we could now play "my music" thanks to a "Mix Tape". The top song was "Bridge Over Troubled Waters".

By 1982 Bose offered the first Premium Stereo System teaming up with GM's Delco to offer it as an option in Oldsmobiles, Buicks, and Cadillacs. The top song was "Physical".

By 1984 Sony introduced an in-dash CD player. The top song was "Careless Whisper". Now, buttons and dials have been replaced by touch screens and Bluetooth. If you don't know what that is, ask your grandchildren. Then, take them on a cruise in your "old car". If it has a radio, let them turn it up loud...

BRANDS WE STILL KNOW

In 1901, Charles R. Walgreen Sr., a pharmacist working at a Chicago Drugstore, purchased the store to run it his way. He founded a new company and called it the Walgreen Drug Company.

Walgreen believed in high quality and began manufacturing his own line of merchandise. He also was a proponent of innovations in merchandising and store displays, and created a bright open environment in his store. He insisted on a level of service and personal attention not found in any other drug stores of the time. He soon opened new stores.


By 1919, there were 20 Walgreen Drug Stores. When prohibition hit, the stores did well as a result of selling prescription whiskey.

In 1922, Walgreens introduced the world's first malted milkshake which led to the company opening ice cream making plants.

By 1930, Walgreens had 397 stores in multiple states.

In 1931, the name changed to Walgreen Drug Stores, and in 1948 to Walgreen's. In 1955, the apostrophe was dropped becoming just Walgreens.





ANSWER


Cars produced in series with roots near Hershey, Pennsylvania, were the Kline, originally from Harrisburg, and the Upton out of Lebanon. The first Kline was constructed by a Hummelstown native (though some say he was from nearby Siddonsburg) by the name of James Allen Kline, who began dabbling with the idea in Harrisburg during 1900 while he was distributing Locomobiles and other brands. In 1905, he moved to York, Pennsylvania, with the York Automobile Company and in 1910, on to Virginia. According to the Virginia Museum of History & Culture that's where he really hit his stride, with some 2,500 to 2,800 now-called Kline Kars produced through 1923. Colcord Upton was behind his 1904-1907 namesake, which was a \$2,500-\$3,000, 40hp, four-cylinder touring car. When it was chartered in 1984, AACA's PA Dutch Region used the Upton as part of its logo.
