

Right now everybody wants their gardens plowed and tilled. I may have to go back to work to rest up." Minutes of the March meeting indicated the meeting started at a new time 6:00 pm. It was held in Watkins Museum with 23 members and guests present. George Lauppe won the door prize, a set of steak knives. Lauppe reported the county planned to install draining tile in the north parking lot. A motion was approved to donate \$100.00 for the St. Patricks Day Parade. Delores reported there is a website that has incorrect information about our swap meet. She needs help in correcting it or deleting it.

20 YEARS AGO - APRIL, 2001

(YES -10 YEARS LATER - Jack Todd was elected President again) His message—"Old Man Winter and his kinfolks Jack Frost, Wind Chill, Ice Strom, Frost Bite, Snow Flakes and Blizzard have really been active this winter. Well, I was wrong! The Lincoln Swap Meet tops it. We left Lawrence at 5:00 am, the streets were dry and the sky was clear. It was 40 degrees. By the time we passed Mayetta, it was raining. North on HI Way 36 it turned to ice, and by the time we got to Lincoln it was snowing and 22 degrees. To top it off we left at noon with nothing to show for it." Minutes of the March meeting reported 24 members were in attendance at 7:05 pm. Scholarship Committee reported two scholarships would be awarded. The Board met and discussed three issues 1,

30 YEARS AGO - APRIL, 1991

Minutes of the April meeting reported Joe Arneson attended for the second time. Lauppe, Scholarship Chairman, reported three applicants for the club's scholarship. Lauppe, Swap Meet Reservation Chairman, reported 111 telephone calls that year as compared to 45 a year earlier over the same period of time. Reservations made by vendors were 141, reserving 675 spaces, as compared to 101 vendors reserving 496 spaces a year earlier. Motion was approved for the club to keep the same telephone number year around. A motion was approved to charge \$20.00 advance reservation and \$25.00 at the gate, for the 1992 swap meet. Club members moved the east fairgrounds fence, 80 feet East, April 13.

Reservation for the swap meet was approved, \$200.00 was the deposit. Lauppe gave a report on the swap meet. Boy Scouts were paid up to \$30 to clean up the fairgronds before dark. Meeting adjourned for refreshments at 9:25 pm.

THE FIRST SPEEDING TICKET ISSUED JANUARY 28, 1896

being so new, every motorist taking to the streets had to have a flag waver walk in front of them to alert people an automobile was coming through. God forbid you scare the horses! So when Walter Arnold raced through the streets of Paddock Wood, Kent on this day in 1896 in his new automobile at an astonishing 8 mph with no flag waver, bystanders were absolutely flabbergasted. A local constable was quick to give chase to bring this heinous crime to an end. The officer jumped on his bicycle and pedaled for 5 miles before catching the driver. Mr. Arnold's terror through town would earn him a spot in the record books, for built and sold Benz autos under license, using the name Arnold Motor Carriage. Later that year, the Locomotives Act raised the speed limit to a breathtaking 14 mph and removed the need for a flag waver. Auto enthusiasts held a race from London to Brighton, notably named the "Emancipation Run," to celebrate the event. Mr. Arnold participated, driving one of his own automobiles. There's no record on how fast he went!


The 1896 Arnold-Benz

SIDE WHEELERS ON THE GRAND RIVER



With the commercial development of steamboats by Robert Fulton in 1807, the growth of quick river travel began starting with the Albany NY to New York City. This was followed by travel on the Great Lakes, Buffalo to Detroit to Grand Haven. One of the first steams to reach Grand Haven was was "Walk-In-The-Water" launched in 1818. Most of these steamers were known as side-wheelers. Early travel on the Grand River from Grand Rapids to Grand Haven was mostly by canoe. The first steamboats were

built at Grand Rapids and began regular service in 1837. This was the same year that Michigan became a state. The first steamboat was named "Governor Mason" who was the Governor of Michigan at that time.

Following the Governor Mason steamboat, numerous steamers were built and plied the Grand, bringing both settlers and supplies to Grand Haven and returning with lumber and other items manufactured in the coastal area of Lake Michigan, including fish and gravel.

Our Antiques in the Attic find is an old postcard of the last side-wheeler, the May Graham, which was sold to the Grand Haven Gravel Company in 1912. The hull was used as a barge and the cabin was converted into a cottage now located on the north side of the channel across from the Escanaba dock in Grand Haven.
