

What brands did he create/acquire to do so?



Stylish Fashions from Yesteryear

1912 Duster

I happened upon this 1912 Duster, in cocoa linen and wide white lace. The wide lace caught my eye, making this very different from every duster I have seen.

To create the wide bands of Guipure lace that appeared on the original, the seamstress combined a wide Cluny lace with narrow lace, stitching it together to replicate the width of the original design.

I was familiar with Cluny lace, a coarse, bobbin lace used for clothing and interiors. I soon learned that Cluny lace is a type of Guipure lace, a heavyweight lace with many uses; it is created with braids giving it a raised design. Made in France and England, this type of lace is coarser than most because of the yarns used.

Needlework lace is constructed mainly using a needle, thread and scissors, tends to feature mesh or not, and as a result, needlework lace can appear very dense.





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MUSIC AND THE AUTOMOBILE

There were many songs published and enjoyed in the early days of the 20th century about the new curiosity of the automobile and they associated it with the old time days of courting. On a list of automobile songs they listed 466 songs. Some we have heard and just about every make, model and engine built had a song. We know about "Mustang Sally", "409" by the Beach Boys, "American Pie" by Don Mclean "Get Your Kicks On Route 66", "Little Red Corvette" and so many more. But the early song writers and publishers jumped fast onto this new concept of cars, dating, speed, and anything else they could tie into the automobile.

In 1913, this one said it all: "He'd Have To get Under; Get Out and Get Under" and in 1928: "Henry's Made A Lady Out Of Lizzie". These songs reflect drivers were then and are still "getting out and getting under" as all car hobbyists know very well.


The music for "My Automobile Girl" was published in 1900 with Lyrics by R. J. Morris. This sheet music was published in 1901, words and music by M. N. Hinds.

This song was one that started the idea to make money off of this new idea of the automobile at the beginning of the century. M. N. Hinds, a songwriter in 1900 wrote "My Automobile Boy" when he saw the early Loomis car made by his friend Gilbert Loomis at Westfield, Massachusetts. Loomis had exhibited this car at the Madison Square Garden Show. He closed his manufacturing plant after only seven years and he became the design engineer for Pope-Hartford. Unfortunately, this song did not have the catchy tune and the name of a specific car within the song so it did not catch on with the public as others did nor did it serve to promote the car make or model.

The automobile was a wonderful new idea that flowed into the music and added to the excitement of this new way of courting and excitement of this machine. This record has great songs. The "Automobile Honeymoon," "The Little Ford Rambled Right Along"(1914) "Tumble In A Rumble Seat" (1933), "Henry's Made A Lady out Of Lizzie," (1928), "Ray and His Little Chevrolet" (1924), "Git A Horse" (1902), "I'm Wild About Horns On Automobiles That Go Ta-Ta-Ta-Ta" (1928), "He'd

Have To Get Under-Get Out and Get Under" (1913), "Take Me ("The Fellow Who Owns An Automobile" (1912), "When He Wanted To Love Her (He Would Put Up The Cover)" (1915) and then on this recording the most famous----"In My Merry Oldsmobile" (1905).

The music associated with the automobile is another part of the hobby. These songs were enjoyed on pianos and Victrolas and reflected feelings and experiences as modern day songs. *Copied with permission of Fran Shore and the South Jersey Region AACA*





THE VOLKSWAGEN "BEETLE" A BRIEF LOOK BACK IN TIME - By Jeff Broadus, Vice President, Marketing

The Volkswagen Beetle is probably the most familiar and easily recognizable automobile in the world. With more than 23,000,000 vehicles sold in over 30 countries, it is the best-selling model in history. Nowhere has the VW been more popular than among the world's young people, who took to it almost right away. It's popularity is still very strong with our youth today, just as it was in the 60s and 70s. It's affordable, inexpensive to maintain, and parts are readily available from numerous aftermarket parts suppliers. It's also an easy way to get started in the hobby with clubs like AACA. Most enthusiasts, however, don't know that the little "bug" almost didn't get off the drawing board, and that the man chiefly responsible for its eventual building was one of history's most infamous despots: Nazi dictator Adolf Hitler.

According to a standard VW press, "The Volkswagen's origins go back to 1931 when Ferdinand Porsche, one of Europe's leading automobile engineers, began working independently to design a small, inexpensive and economically operated car for the public. Unable to convince European automobile companies that they could tap a major market and increase sales tremendously with the low-cost 'people's car' (or Volkswagen) he envisioned, Porsche was turned down in all his requests for financial support. Professor Porsche poured his own resources into his design project, hoping against all odds that he could make a success of his small car dream. Then in 1933, shortly after the Nazi Party gained power in Germany, Hitler opened the Berlin Automobile Show with a speech in which he discussed the need for a small, inexpensive car for the average man. That same year, Hitler recalled meeting Dr. Porsche a decade earlier at an auto race and reached out to him about his plan. As it turned out, Dr. Porsche had already drafted the solution, "The VW

Hitler ordered Porsche and the standoffish Society of German Automobile Manufacturers to produce just such a small, low-cost auto. In fact, he told Porsche to design a car that could be sold for about \$140, a figure that the Professor himself regarded as impossible. Porsche knew that even with America's then vaunted mass production techniques, its least expensive automobiles then sold for about \$425.

Nevertheless, the Nazis went ahead with their plans and financial support of the embryonic VW, and the project. At the 1937 Berlin Auto Show, Hitler and Ley were briefed by Dr. Porsche on a VW prototype model, and it was agreed that the car would be manufactured and sold by the Nazi Kraft durch Freude, or KdF movement, which in English translates to "Strength Through Joy," under which German workers received discount vacations and other such niceties. And so a car is born.

After the war, a postwar British commission reported after visiting Wolfsburg, the VW "does not meet the fundamental technical requirements of a motorcar. As regards performance and design, it is quite unattractive to the average motorcar buyer. It is too ugly and too noisy...a type of car like this will remain popular for

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or three years, if that. To build the car commercially would be an uneconomic failure." Never was an official government report more inaccurate! Production increased from 100,000 in 1951 to over a million a decade later!

Still, negativism about the little car died hard. When Heinz Nordhoff, a VW executive, brought the plans to the US in 1949 to raise some American venture capital, a customs official in New York - after having seen photos of the vehicle - told the executive that he was sure no such car was produced anywhere in the world, and, even if it were, no one would ever buy it!


