

Report: California Looking To Restrict Travel For Classic Car Posted on 09/25/2023 by Steven Symes theautowire.com

The state is looking at instituting "zeroemission zones" soon.

The state of California is looking seriously at instituting or allowing local governments to institute zero-emission zones in the near future. In preparation for such a move, the California Air Resources Board (CARB) reportedly is gathering information about classic cars and how their owners use them. We knew something like this was coming to the US and California would likely be first, but this is still concerning.



According to a Daily Caller report, on August 2 CARB sent a survey to owners of classic cars from model year 1978 or earlier. The questions were aimed at ascertaining how those classics are used and stored, as well as where they're driven. It even asks about how many miles show on owners' odometers. Knowing how increasingly authoritarian many government agencies seems to be trending, this is concerning to many car enthusiasts who still live in the Golden State.

Back in the day, California was arguably the epicenter of cool car culture with many legendary brands, builders, and other hobbyists emerging from the state. That all emerged at a time when individual expression, no institutionalized expression, reigned supreme. Unfortunately, that looks to be going the way of the dodo before long.

Daily Caller also points out how CARB issued a report back in 2019 suggesting the state should allow "local jurisdictions to create zero-emissions zones." If that sounds a little too similar to the ULEZ zones that have taken over all of London's boroughs in the UK, with plate readers fining people daily for violations, you're not alone.

California car culture already isn't what it used to be but is still pretty amazing. However, moves like this could accelerate the current trajectory.

Of course, the justification for full-on banning older cars from certain areas or making the owners pay a daily fee to drive there is climate change. After seeing the amount of emissions produced by private jets, cruise ships, EV mining/production, Space X rockets, and many other things that are widely celebrated, defended, and/or enjoyed one can't help but feel cynical about these mounting restrictions.

But California has a net-zero carbon emissions goal set for 2045 and so we can expect even more restrictions on the horizon. We hope it doesn't get to the point that authorities go door to door looking for classic cars to seize and crush, but the mere mention of zero-emission zones would've been dismissed as crazy conspiracy theory only a few short years ago.

THE TALE OF THE "HELP YOURSELF" GAS PUMP

"History is written the way it is formed - little by little." With this introduction, AACA's chief of judges, Bert S. Harrington, Jr., recently informed ANTIQUE AUTOMOBILE that his father, Bert S. Harrington, Sr., was himself a pioneer in the gasoline pump field. He submitted the information below on that venture to add to Dr. G. Richard Minnick's recent two-part series on the subject.

The senior Mr. Harrington, now retired and living in Chattanooga, Tennessee, had an idea for a coin-operated, self-service gasoline pump and, in 1924-25, he built and sold this pump.

A prototype unit was designed and built in the Armour & Co. machine shop, Fort Worth, Texas, under Mr. Harrington's close supervision. It incorporated the principles of a pump equipped for a micrometer length stroke adjustable for the desired volume of delivery.

This permitted adjustment to deliver a precise amount of liquid in return for coins inserted in appropriate slots. The unit was tested and found to be quite accurate and acceptable since it had the popular glass bowl at the top to receive the measured fuel for inspection before delivering the gasoline through a hose to the automobile.

A significant feature was the large circular star-wheel arrangement that allowed the last coins inserted to remain visible to discourage the use of slugs. Quarters, halves, and dollars could be used, each calibrated for value received.

The unit was assigned to The Mechanical Manufacturing Co., a Chicago meat packing machinery concern, now known as the Allbright-Neil Co., a division of Chemetron Corp. This concern was equipped to manufacture the pump, since similar pumps were in use, like-wise invented by Harrington, Sr., for dispensing lard, shortening, and cooking oils in retail-size containers.



Some 50 of the Harrington "Help Y ourself" coin-operated gasoline pumps were sold and installed. The young man examining this pump in February, 1925 is none other than AACA's chief of Judges, Bert S. Harrington, Jr.

This dispensing pump, by its own vacuum, lifted gasoline from the underground storage tank whenever the crank handle was released by the insertion of coins. The gasoline was then deposited overhead as described above.

Fifty units were sold. Patent applications were made, and manufacture of the pumps seemed assured. Then came the ruling from the Underwriters Laboratories, "Then when and where gasoline was dispensed to automobiles, there must be an experienced attendant present to actually dispense the gasoline."

It seems that a filling station in a town near Boston, Mass, devised a pan for holding gasoline under pressure in underground storage tanks. A devise was built to allow given amounts to be dispensed in some manner. One night, a purchaser forgot to take the hose out of his gas tank, cranked the car and drove off.

The hose ripped the unit loose from its moorings, permitting the storage tank to expel its load of gasoline on the ground since it was under pressure.



Yes, it caught fire and burned down a block of buildings. So, for another's blunder, there are no coin operated gas pumps.

In concluding, it is well to note that the coin-operated gasoline pump was not Mr. Harrington's only contribution to the automobile industry. He was also the first to build a power-driven siren. He built five in Rome, Georgia during 1912 and mounted them on fire trucks. American LeFrance purchased rights to manufacture the siren and install it on fire equipment in 1913. Previous to that, all sirens had been hand operated.





ANSWER

Having constructed a tractor plant in Dearborn during 1918, Ford quickly realized that there was a housing shortage in the area. So a year later, the Dearborn Realty and Construction Company was established (by Ford) to help solve the problem. By October 1919, 94 homes were constructed with an additional 156 built in 1920. An entry-level Model A sold for \$5,750 while the upscale F cost \$9,550 (there was also a Model B, C, D and E in between.) The area is now known as the Ford Homes Historic District.
