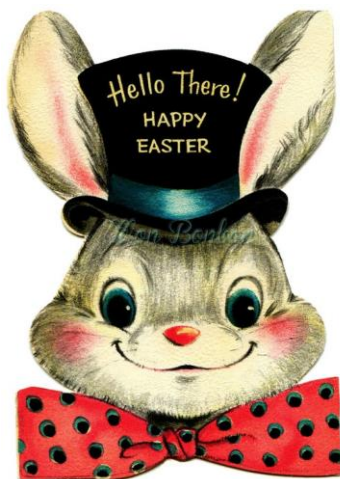

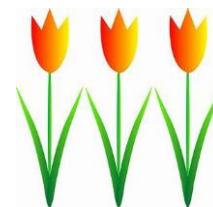

SWAP MEET PLANNING MEETING

The 2025 Swap Meet Planning Meeting was held 03/10/2025 at the home of Chairman, Joe Arneson. - Joe passed out work sheets and asked if anyone not available for their shift to please contact him as soon as possible to reschedule. We will need all-hands-on-deck to be successful this year. There are already over 300 vendors and may prove to be a very busy year.

- Woody Woodring will take care of the Porta-Potties again and it was decided that 4 would be needed with no handicap, since the fairgrounds has so many public restrooms available now. The stone building on the south side and the Rodeo Arena will both be closed this year. Showers are available in the Pavilion building.

- It was discussed that vendors that leave the fairgrounds and want to come back in without their hang tags will not be let back in. Some vendors like to share their hang tags with their friends for free parking and shopping and that is discouraged. Vendors will be issued 2 hang tags at entry regardless of how many slots that have reserved. If more are needed to can go the main gate and request them.

- The Bean Supper will still be held on Saturday at 4 PM. The number was reduced down to 250 from the 300 from 2024 at \$5 per plate. 4H Club will provide.

- **April 28th, Monday**, will be mowing work day. Steve Hubbard will provide the mower as Heritage no longer can provide.

- **May 1st, Thursday** is work day to get set up. Starting about 8 AM. The regular monthly meeting will be held in the Flory building at 6 PM with a catered BBQ dinner.

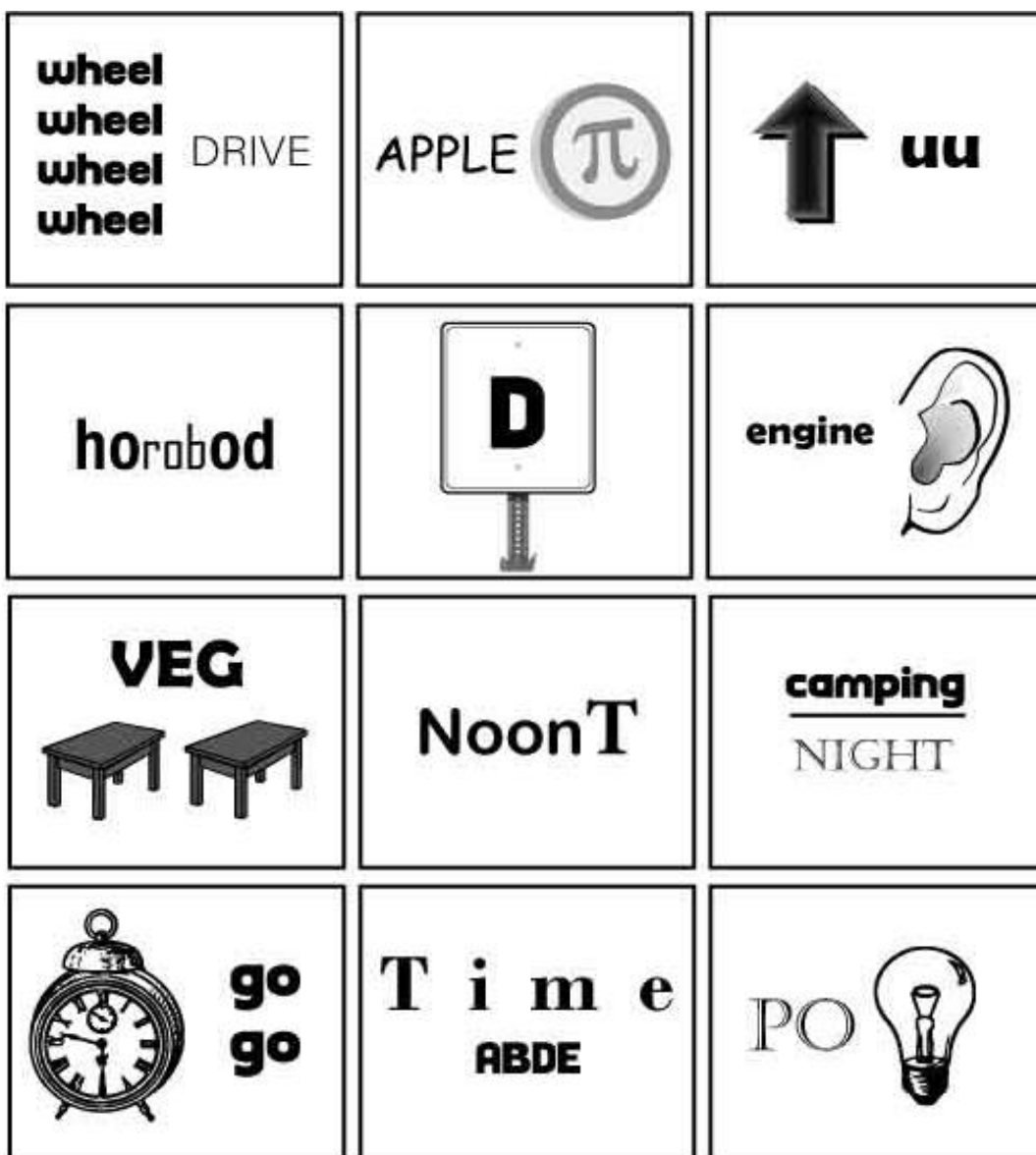
- **May 2nd, Friday** will begin at 6 AM and vendors will be let in sometime before noon, but probably around 9-10 AM

Please let Joe know as soon as possible is you can't work on Thursday or Friday.

- **May 3rd, Saturday** will begin at 6 AM again all-hands-on-deck.
- Finding someone to man the public parking has proven challenging this year. Joe is still trying to find a group interested, but so far he has had no luck. The club pays \$700 for parking oversight, if anyone or a group might be interested in a fund-raiser.
- If used tires are left on grounds this year, they may be disposed of by members in the Lawrence recycling. The city allows an individual to get rid of 4 tires through the trash program.
- There was discussion on where to put handicap parking and that's to be determined.
- Food committee will meet separately to plan the menu and compose a list of work schedule.
- Next Meeting is April 7th at Joe Arneson's at 6 PM.

ATTORNEY: And why did that upset you?

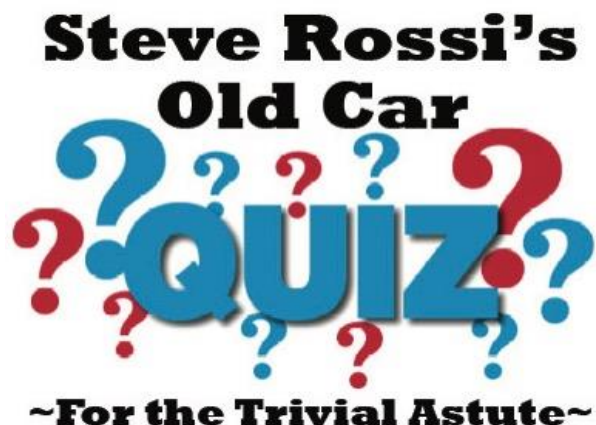

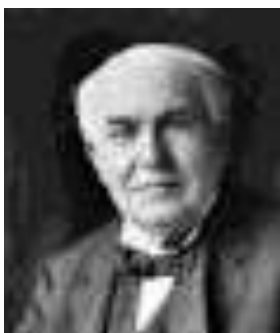

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Thomas Edison and Henry Ford

Phil, Each day I send my grandchildren something of encouragement titled "Papa's Word of the Day" that I think might be useful if they apply it to their lives. Today, I sent this, and I am sending it on to you simply because of the Henry Ford story. I checked it out on the internet, and it is a true story. You might use it sometime in the future in one of your monthly newsletters.

In 1896, Thomas Edison, the great inventor of the electric bulb, was working on a car design when he learned that a young man in his company had created an experimental car. Edison met this young man, Henry Ford, at a company party in New York and was thoroughly impressed by his gasoline-powered car idea. Edison, who had been considering electricity as a power source, enthusiastically encouraged Ford, saying, "Young man, that's the thing! You have it! I think you are on to something! I encourage you to continue your pursuits!"

Encouraged by the respected inventor, Henry Ford continued his work, eventually inventing a car that made him wealthy. On December 9, 1914, Edison's laboratory and factory were destroyed by fire. At 67 years old, the damage was too extensive for insurance to cover. Before the ashes were cold, Henry Ford handed Edison a check for \$750,000 with a note saying Edison could have more if needed. In 1916, Ford relocated his home next to Edison's. When Edison was later confined to a wheelchair, Ford also got a wheelchair so they could race each other.

Thomas Edison made Henry Ford believe in himself, creating a friendship for life.

LESSON:

Don't ever be jealous of others' success. If you can't win a race, help the person in front of you break the record. Your candle doesn't lose its light by lighting another.

Let us follow this example of supporting and uplifting each other.

BRANDS WE STILL KNOW

LOWE'S STORES

In 1921, Lucius Smith Lowe opened a hardware store in North Wilkesboro, NC. His store sold the normal general store supplies like sewing items, hardware, dry goods, and groceries, etc. It also supplied building materials.

After Lowe died in 1940, his daughter Ruth inherited the business, but she quickly sold it to her brother, James Lowe.

James brought in Ruth's husband H. Carl Buchan as a partner in 1943. It was Buchan who anticipated the post-WWII construction boom, and caused the business to move more toward the building material trade, eliminating the small general store items. He also started the practice of buying directly from the manufacturers, eliminating the middle man, which allowed the company to offer lower prices. The second Lowe's store opened in 1949 in Sparta, NC. Buchan bought out the company in 1952.

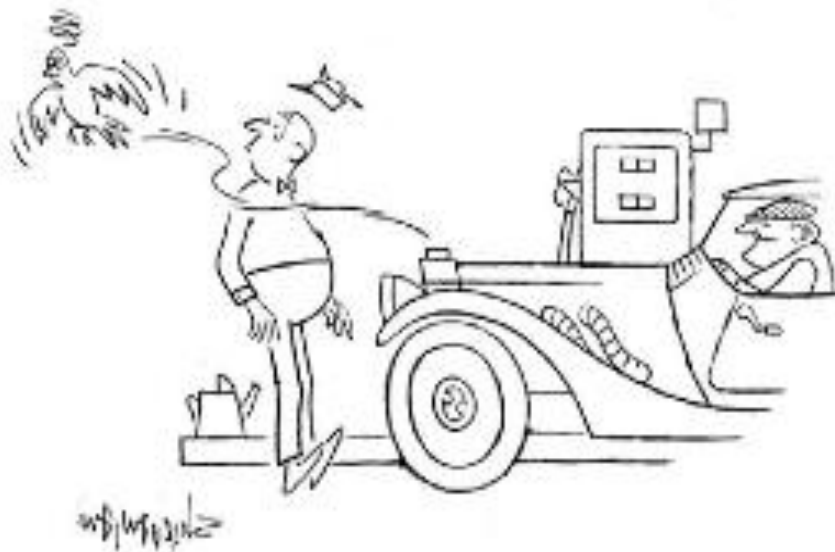
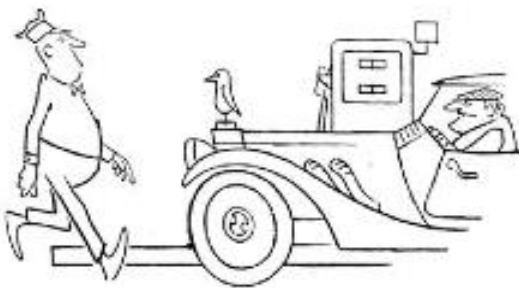
